Zacchaeus Muhammad Alazar was an Algerian Stavrosian.

After trying to start another political party in Algeria, he was pushed out and hunted by Algerian forces. Zacchaeus escaped being arrested when Captain James D. (of the S.G.L.) arrived at his home before the police got there, February 6, 2022. It took ten fearful days of hide and seek trying to avoid capture as the captain led the family across Algeria heading for the border to where help was waiting.

He and his daughter will no longer be hunted like criminals. They are now Mexican Stavrosian's" and they will get new names.
